



Town Hall Complex and Central Library Transformation.

- New public face and signpost for heritage tourists/visitors - providing unique opportunities to discover, share, celebrate and create the stories of Manchester's history and communities.








Central Library Development Trust

Library performance – A damp squid

In England since 2006
Book issues have fallen by 9.3%
Visits have fallen by 11%
Net expenditure has fallen by 6.4%
Total FTE has fallen by 20.5%
Since 2009/10 – 181 service points have closed
In July 2012 – ACE and LGA reported 254 community managed libraries

And the good news

At least 24 people visit a library every second
17 books borrowed every second
We supported 2 million people online
22,187 volunteers within the public library network
Liverpool, Birmingham and Manchester Central
Libraries
Many libraries refurbished, re-sited and extended
Library offer focused on people not buildings
