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
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



It's a beautiful day!


The sun is giving off the happiest rays.

Granny is so happy telling her grandchildren to get ready. We are going to Pad-riew!






Chacherngsao or Pad-riew isn't so far.

From Bangkok it's not that far.


The farmers here work like donkeys.


The children explore the rice fields with Granny.


This is where rice is grown.

They grow rice for the country and get money to support their families.










"It's an ancient floating market," said Granny.




A lot of things catch our eye as vendors row and pass us by.














Fruits, veggies,
and many crops they grow.


Granny is picking plum mangoes and mangoes.

The Khao Hin Sorn Development Study Center was founded to conduct research on land development to ensure its fertility.


The road is easy and convenient to drive.

Let's go to **Bor Thong** Waterfall--it's near!




Amphoe Bangpakong is located near the sea. In the mangrove forests, there are six months of seawater and the other six months of freshwater.







Chacherngsao is a province in the eastern region of Thailand. Its neighbors are Bangkok, Chon Buri, Samut Prakan, Pathum Thani, Nakhon Nayok, Prachin Buri, Sa Kaeo, and Chanthaburi.

Pad-riew is what people have called Chacherngsao since the old times. The legend was that Chacherngsao was so fertile that the fish caught in the Bangpakong river, when dried, could be cut into eight slices. (pad= eight, riew=slice)

Chacherngsao's slogan is "Bangpakong River is where life begins, Wash away your sins with Luangpor Sotorn, It is home to Praya Srisoontorn, an expert in Thai, Aang-rue-nai remains a virgin forest".

The provincial seal shows the ordination hall of Buddha Sotorn Royal temple. The provincial flower is the yellow flamboyant.

Most parts of the province are low river plains, some are delineated by a partial ring of hills. There are also plateaus, hills, and alluvial plains. In the coastal areas, there are plains and mangrove forests.

The people in Chacherngsao are proud of Luang Por Pra Buddha Sotorn, the giant reclining Ganesha statue, Praya Srisoontorn Woharn, Aang-rue-nai Wildlife Sanctuary, and the Bangpakong river.

Tourist attractions in Chacherngsao include the Buddha Sotorn Royal temple, the century old markets of Banmai and Klong Suan, the old market of Nakorn Neung Khet, Samarn Rattanaram Temple, Hin Sorn Mountain, the Chinese Community's Temple, Poe Bangkla Temple's flying foxes, the wildlife sanctuary at Aang-rue-nai, and Bangpakong river cruises.

There are 11 amphoes (districts) and 93 tambons (sub-districts), and 859 villages in Chacherngsao.

The 11 amphoes are Muang Chacherngsao, Bangkla, Bangnampreaw, Bangpakong, Banpoe, Panom Sarakam, Ratchasaan, Sanamchaikhet, Plangkhao, Tha-ta-kieb, and Klong kien.



Associate Professor Krirk Yoonpun

Associate Professor Kirk Yoonpun earned Master of Arts degree from Srinakharinwirot University. He has been an author and illustrator of children's books for more than 30 years.

Currently, he is a lecturer on the topic of children's books within the Library Science Department of the Faculty of Arts, Srinakharinwirot University.

His books have been judged to be 'distinguished' and 'excellent' by many of the national book fairs. In addition to writing and illustrating, he publishes under the imprint 'Krirk Yoonpun'. He also founded the 'Lan Khong Len' (Million Toy) Museum in Ayutthaya.


published by the Chulalongkorn University Language Institute.
